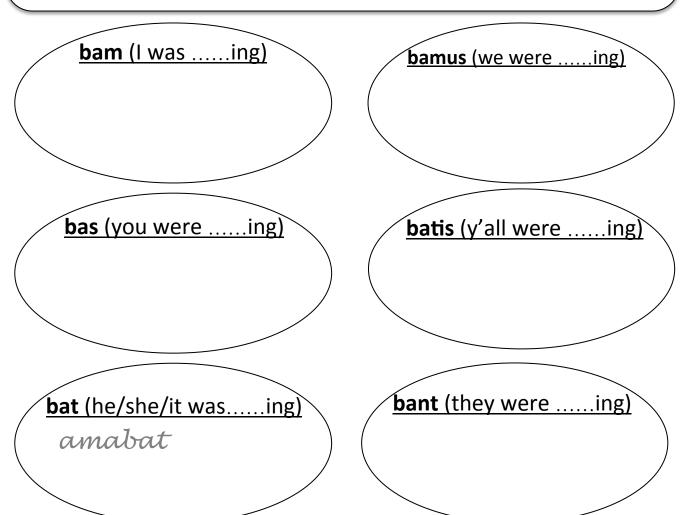
## L.O. To sort Latin past continuous verbs by their ending

The endings of Latin verbs don't just tell us who's doing the verb, they also tell us when it's happening. Latin shows that the verb was happening in the past (and was happening over a period of time) by using special past continuous endings. They look like this:

singular	plural
<b>bam</b> = I wasing	bamus = we wereing
bas = you wereing	<b>batis</b> = y'all wereing
bat = he, she or it wasing	bant = they wereing

Sort these Latin verbs by their ending. One has been done to show you how.

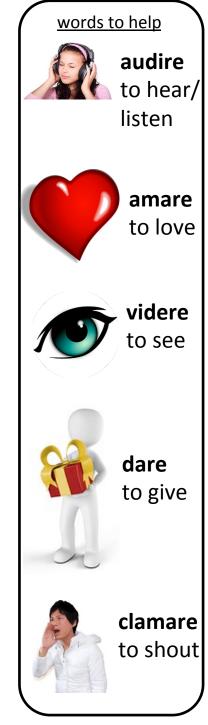
