Draw the object and then write 5 or more **expanded** noun phrases to describe the object (no sentences).

2. Think & solve.

Hot: A number rounded to the nearest hundred is 600. What is the largest possible number it could be? What is the smallest it could be?

Hotter & Hottest: A number rounded to the nearest thousand is 76,000 What is the largest possible number it could be? What is the smallest it could be?

3. Find five different six digit numbers where the digit sum is five and the thousands digit is two.

Strategies and Methods to practise spellings.

- 1. Look Say Cover Write Check
 - Look: first look at the whole word carefully and if there is one part of the word that is difficult, look at that part in more detail.
 - Say: say the word as you look at it, using different ways of pronouncing it if that will make it more memorable.
 - Cover: cover the word.
 - Write: write the word from memory, saying the word as you do so.
 - Check: Have you got it right? If yes, try writing it again and again! If not, start again.
- 2. Trace Copy Replicate:
 - Write the word out on a sheet of paper ensuring that it is spelt correctly and it is large enough to trace over.
 Trace over the word and say it at the same time. Move next to the word you have just written and write it out as you say it. Turn the page over and write the word as you say it, and then check that you have spelt it correctly.
- 3. Segmentation: split the word into its phonemes/sounds, (won-der-ful)
- 4. Speed-/Quickwrite: write the words in a set time-limit. Check that you get faster.
- Drawing around to create a shape: write the word repeatedly and aim to get exactly the same shape again,
- Drawing an image around the word: used as an additional (not your main) method, this is fun and helps remember tricky parts of the word.
- 7. Words without vowels: Write the word leaving out the vowels and then let others guess what word that is.
- 8. Pyramid words: You can begin in the centre, front or back of the word.
- 9. Other strategies:
 - Rainbow writing: Using coloured pencils in different ways can help to make parts of words memorable. You could highlight the tricky parts of the word or write the tricky part in a different colour. You could also write each letter in a different colour, or write the word in red, then overlay in orange, yellow and so on.
 - Mnemonics: Making up memorable 'silly sentences' containing the word.
 - Saying the word in a funny way for example, pronouncing the 'silent' letters in a word.
 - Clapping and counting to identify the syllables in a word.
