We would like to wish all our families celebrating Eid this week a very happy and peaceful Eid!






Year 2 Our Science topic this term is all about plants. The children learnt about the life cycles of plants and created a lifecycle of their own. We then linked this to Art - children manipulated clay in different ways - squeezing, pulling, pinching, rolling and creating a hollow etc. They then used these techniques to make pinch pots and flowers. Once the clay dried, we painted the flowers in bright colours.





Children in Waterloo LOVE making their own Maths and English games when they have the time. We have a new addition and subtraction game and a matching new vocabulary to their definitions game.

<u>Year 4</u>

Over the past 2 weeks, Year 4 have been busy making their very own rainforest themed bags using their sewing skills. We then designed them using fabric crayons and evaluated them to test their strength.











Both Year 5 classes have enjoyed fantastic trips to Sutton Ecology Centre recently, in connection with their Science topic on Life Cycles. They had the opportunity to engage in pond dipping, looking at the creatures they had found under a microscope in order to categorise them and making observational sketches. Among the wildlife they found were newts, tadpoles in various stages of development, snails, leeches, water boatmen and nymphs. It was brilliant to see the awe and wonder they experienced on finding each specimen!









We have also been enjoying a new fascinating History topic—the Kingdom of Benin. To help us understand the significance and chronology of this civilisation, we each donned tabards, taking us back in time through history. We learnt that the Kingdom of Benin lasted longer than the majority of time periods we have already learnt about, including the Anglo-Saxons, Vikings and Romans, beginning in around 900CE and coming to a drastic end in 1897, the same year in which our school was built!









In our History lessons, we have been learning about Migration to Britain. In our most recent lessons, we have been learning about the Windrush Generation. Children have created a series of Google Slides to display their knowledge and have been sharing their presentations with the class.

In English, we have just finished our core text Orange for the Sunsets, by Tina Athaide. In a few weeks, we shall be having a Zoom Call with the author to share our recent work, which has been based on her novel. Very excitingly, children will be given the chance to ask her questions about the text that they have been thinking about throughout our unit.

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In conclusion, the representatives came out feeling triumphant and victorious, winning the competition! (Words by Wan Ru Lin, Y6)








